




The end of maintenance training is in sight; back in April, I took and passed my general and airframe oral and practical tests. I then took and passed my written airframe exam. Which means that the FAA sent me a shiny new card saying I could practice as a licensed airframe mechanic. But there was no time to take a breath; we went headlong into the powerplant module of my training.

Our class was separated into groups of 3 or 4 students and then given an engine to disassemble, clean, inspect, repair and reassemble. Our team was given a Lycoming IO-540 which is a very large, complicated engine. We are up for the challenge! One of the guys on our team requested it because he is a helicopter pilot and these engines are used extensively in various types of helicopters. As you can see at the right, there may have been a little bit of overspray during our non-destructive testing. I will be taking my powerplant oral and practical tests on August 15th and would appreciate all



prayers! The written will come at the end of classes on August 26th.
